A Message from the Principal

A huge thank you to our Prep teacher, Suzie Hicks and her team of helpers for organising the Book Fair that ran during Education Week. It was also great to see families formulating wish lists and purchasing books to share. The money raised from the Book Fair along with money raised from the Chocolate Drive will go towards cooling in the gym. This was approved by School Council at the beginning of the year. The money raised from the Easter Raffle went towards the Mothers' Day stall. We have about half the funds required for the large ceiling fan in the gym. The cost of the fans is approximately \$16,000. The fan will benefit all who work, learn and play in the gym, especially as the weather gets warmer.

Thank you to the parents who have recently come to see me with regard to student safety after the recent media items involving primary school students. Our school processes with regard to excursions and yard supervision comply with the Department of Education standards. I appreciate your concerns and want to assure our school community that we have practices in place that not only comply with the Department of Education requirements but where possible, are above the minimum ratio for teacher / student quotient on yard duty, excursions and camps. We believe students need to be educated in adhering to stranger danger warnings. Students are repeatedly told not to play near fences or leave the school grounds to retrieve balls. It is important we reassure our children to be alert but not fearful. To look out for their friends and to let an adult know immediately if they are feeling unsafe or threatened in any way. By educating our children we hope even if they are not within the safe environment of school or home they continue to follow safety processes.

PREMIERS' READING CHALLENGE

The 2014 Victorian Premiers' Reading Challenge has been open for quite some time now and we have 38 students already registered.

Since 2005, the Challenge has inspired students to read more and has encouraged families to support the literacy development of children.

The Challenge is not a competition - the emphasis is on individual challenge, participation and achievement, which we like to celebrate at Roxburgh Homestead Primary School.

The Challenge will remain open until late Term 3 so I would invite you to encourage your children participate. There's still plenty of time for students to reach their reading goals. From Prep to Year 2, students are challenged to read 30 books, or read these with their family, guardian or teacher. Students in Years 3 and beyond are challenged to read 15 books.

There are so many books to choose from, with fiction, non-fiction, picture books, plays, poetry, short stories and graphic novels on offer.

WHY "IT'S NOT OK TO BE LATE TO SCHOOL"

Students being late to school can have an effect on the teacher, other students in their class and themselves in the following ways.

Latecomers:

- ◆ Miss out on playing with other children before school
- ◆ Miss out on organisation time, for example, getting their workbooks and pencil case from their tubs
- ◆ Can arrive at the classroom to find that their class has gone to a specialist lesson and they do not know where to go
- ◆ Miss out on hearing what's happening for the day
- ◆ Miss out on roll marking, lunch orders being sent to the canteen and taking the roll and cash book to the office—their money and lunch orders often stay in their school bag
